A Guide to preparing for a funeral at the crematorium



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Introduction

Losing a loved one can often be a traumatic experience. As well as dealing with grief and loss, there are lots of practical things to be sorted out. This guide aims to help you think about the arrangements for the funeral service in preparation for meeting with the vicar to decide on the contents of the funeral service.

Each section of looks at a particular aspect of the service and helps you to think what would be most suitable for you and the deceased. But don't feel you have to have everything decided before you meet the vicar to plan the service. He will help you plan it when you meet.

Service outline for a service at a Crematorium

The service is usually ~20mins in length, and once people coming in and going out has been taken into account the slot is 30mins long. Below is a typical order of service which can tailored to your needs

Bible Readings

There is normally a bible reading from the psalms or the New Testament. Have a read through the potential bible readings to see which one you would like.

Psalms

Psalm 23

1 The Lord is my shepherd; therefore can I lack nothing.

2 He makes me lie down in green pastures and leads me beside still waters.

3 He shall refresh my soul and guide me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

4 Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.

5 You spread a table before me in the presence of those who trouble me; you have anointed my head with oil and my cup shall be full.

6 Surely goodness and loving mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

Psalm 121

- ¹ I lift up my eyes to the mountains where does my help come from?
- ² My help comes from the LORD, the Maker of heaven and earth.
- ³ He will not let your foot slip he who watches over you will not slumber;
- ⁴ indeed, he who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.
- ⁵ The LORD watches over you the LORD is your shade at your right hand;

New Testament Readings

John 6.35-40

Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. But I said to you that you have seen me and yet do not believe. Everything that the Father gives me will come to me, and anyone who comes to me I will never drive away; for I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of him who sent me. And this is the will of him who sent me, that I should lose nothing of all that he has given me, but raise it up on the last day. This is indeed the will of my Father, that all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life; and I will raise them up on the last day.'

John 11.17-27

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him.' Jesus said to her, 'Your brother will rise again.' Martha said to him, 'I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' She said to him, 'Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world.'

John 14.1-6

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going.' Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?' Jesus said to him, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.'

Romans 8.31-end

What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, 'For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Revelation 21.1-7

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more,

for the first things have passed away.' And the one who was seated on the throne said, 'See, I am making all things new.' Also he said, 'Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true.' Then he said to me, 'It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life. Order of Service

An option that the family can choose is to have a printed service of order for the funeral service. This can include things such as a photograph of the deceased, the titles of the music for entering and leaving the chapel and the words of the Lord's prayer. If this is something you would like please speak to the funeral directors and mention it to the vicar when you meet with them.

Eulogy/tribute

As part of the service there is usually some words said by way of tribute about the deceased. This can be said by a family member or friend, or by the vicar on behalf of the family. What is said is up to the family to choose, often it can include something about the person's life, their family, places they worked, what they were like as a person. There is no set length for the eulogy, but around 500-600 words is suitable.

Prayers

Prayer is a vital part of the Christian faith and as the family of the deceased you will have been prayed for at church on the Sunday before the service, and again on the Sunday following the funeral service.

Prayers will also be said at the funeral itself. You may want to think about who are the key family members or friends for whom it would be good to prayed for by name.

Hymns

When thinking about hymns it is good to choose ones that most people will know. You don't have to have a hymn, but below is a list of hymns that people have chosen in the past, you could pick from this list or they may be others which are known to you, or have particular meaning for you.
